REQUIRED BY ACT OF CONGRESS OF MARCH 5, 1874

This oath may be administered by a duly commissioned postmaster, but not by a deputy postmaster, assistant postmaster, acting postmaster, or clerk employed in a post office.

This certificate must be returned to the office of the Second Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Railway Adjustments.

Postmasters are not permitted to charge any fee for administering the oath.
